GCSE English Exams: A Summary

GCSE English Literature

- Paper 1 Shakespeare and the 19th-century novel (1 hour 45 minutes):
 - Section A: Shakespeare
 - Macbeth question: 34 marks, including 4 marks for AO4 (spelling, punctuation, grammar). You are provided with an extract from the play. The essay task requires you to write about the extract <u>and</u> the rest of the play.
 - Section B: 19th-century novel
 - A Christmas Carol question: 30 marks. You are provided with an extract from the novel. The essay task requires you to write about the extract <u>and</u> the rest of the novel.

• Paper 2 Modern texts and poetry (2 hours 15 minutes):

- Section A: Modern prose or drama
 - An Inspector Calls question: 34 marks, including 4 marks for AO4 (spelling, punctuation, grammar). You are given a choice of two questions: answer <u>one</u>. No extract provided.

• Section B: Poetry anthology

 Power and Conflict cluster question: 30 marks. You are provided with one poem from the cluster. The essay task requires you to compare the poem provided with <u>one</u> other poem from the cluster.

• Section C: Unseen poetry

- There are two questions in this section:
 - In question 1 (24 marks) you are given a poem and asked to analyse the poet's presentation of a particular topic or theme.
 - In question 2 (8 marks) you are given a second poem and asked to compare the ways in which both poets present a particular topic or theme.

GCSE English Language

- Paper 1 Explorations in creative reading and writing (1 hour and 45 minutes):
 - Section A: Reading (1 hour, including reading the source)
 - You are given Source A, an extract from a piece of fiction (novel or short story). You are then asked a series of four questions:
 - 1: simple reading comprehension (4 marks).
 - 2: analysis of the use of language in a specific part of Source A (8 marks).
 - 3: analysis of the use of structure in the whole of Source A (8 marks).
 - 4: essay-style response to another reader's statement on Source A (20 marks)
 - Section B: Writing (45 minutes)
 - You are given a choice of two creative writing tasks (to write a narrative or a description, for example): pick <u>one</u>. A picture stimulus may be used for one of the tasks, and they will be related to Source A (see Section A).
 - This section is worth 40 marks in total: 24 for content and organisation, and 16 for technical accuracy.
 - It is recommended that you plan your piece before writing.
- Paper 2 Writers' viewpoints and perspectives (1 hour 45 minutes):
 - Section A: Reading (1 hour, including reading the sources)
 - You are given Source A, a piece of modern nonfiction, and Source B, a piece of 19th-century nonfiction. You are then asked a series of four questions:
 - 1: simple reading comprehension (4 marks).
 - 2: summary of the differences between an aspect of both Source A and Source B (8 marks).
 - 3: analysis of the use of language in Source B (12 marks).
 - 4: essay-style comparison between Source A and Source B, focusing on the writers' different viewpoints on a particular subject (16 marks)

• Section B: Writing (45 minutes)

- You are given <u>one</u> writing task (to write a piece of nonfiction, such as a newspaper article), which will specify your audience and purpose. A statement may be used as a stimulus, which may relate to topics in Source A and Source B (see Section A).
- This section is worth 40 marks in total: 24 for content and organisation, and 16 for technical accuracy.
- It is recommended that you plan your piece before writing.
