4 - 4 Old Boy's Goal Fest

In the annual First XI v Old Boys game the crowd was not only treated to some fantastic weather, but also a high array of distinguished talent. Within a few minutes, the crowd were already treated to some light entertainment by Ben Machin, who after crossing from the right failed to realise that there was a corner post in his way, and after subsequently falling over the corner post quietly took up his position hoping no-one noticed him. They did. The first meaningful on field action resulted in a goal, when Jamie Shaw followed up for a tap in after keeper Tom Maplethorpe had been unable to hold the initial Old Boys shot. The Old Boys were looking dangerous, especially from Machin crosses from the right (who by this point was more concerned about the corner post than any First XI defender). However, the First X1, led by captain Chris Bates, dug deep and were able to haul themselves back into the game. After a couple of efforts had easily been dealt with by keeper Danny Tomlinson, an equaliser was scored. Will Allen pushed forward from right wing back, and his shot was going wide before Gareth Burton nipped in to take the ball round Tomlinson and score into an empty net. Gareth Burton then had a chance to score again a couple minutes later, but failed to get a good connection from a Chris Bates corner. With half an hour gone it was commented by much of the crowd about how well centre back Dom Fieldhouse was looking after Jamie Shaw. The First XI then took the lead after some poor defending from the Old Boys. It was a long Joe Braithwaite ball downfield that caused the problem and Ben Elkington was able to get a shot off through two defenders past the unsighted Tomlinson in goal. The First XI were now buzzing with confidence and took control for the rest of the first half, with a couple of opportunities to extend their lead. The First XI tactic of playing three upfront was really troubling the Old Boys, with Burton, Elkington and Paul Crampton causing all sorts of problems. With added confidence, the first XI were now playing close to "total football" and David Broadbent proved this with a flick past Mr Young which left him clearly embarrassed. At half time the First XI were unlucky not to be leading by more than a 2-1 score line. Mr Wilkinson felt the score at half time was a fair one, while First XI defender Johnny Green felt that his team had played the better football. With Gareth Tomlinson in goal for the First XI now, for the second year running at the opposite ends of the pitch were the Tomlinson brothers. The question was who would be the victor at the end of 90 minutes. After the change over at half time, the Old Boys were happy to see the wind pick up in their favour but were unable to take advantage of this in the opening stages of the half.. However, after 55 minutes Jamie Shaw again showed his class by controlling a free kick and expertly firing an equaliser into the corner of the net. A hardly deserved goal, but it levelled things up again.

The Old Boys had a chance to retake the lead when Gareth Tomlinson handled outside the area, but the free kick was not just put over the bar, but also the fence, and then the hedge, and ended up in the cemetery. Carre's legend Mr. White, along with the rest of the crowd had a little chuckle to themselves about the awful quality of that free kick. The final quarter, due to both fatigue and some quality play saw a goal fest for the crowd to enjoy. It all started when, you guessed it, Jamie Shaw collected the ball 30 yards from goal, turned his marker before sliding it past the helpless dive of the younger Tomlinson. This gave Shaw his hattrick, but much of the Old Boys play was running through either winger Robin Holderness or central midfielder Craig Wells. However, Shaw was doing an expert job at putting the ball away. The First XI heads could have dropped after this, but to their credit they got straight back into the game. At this point, England Schoolboys star Tom Siddons was introduced to the game and straight away he made an impact. On a pitch not conducive to attractive football both teams were unable to find there rhythm in the opening stages, but Carre's were able to take the lead when a through ball from Josh Bryan found central midfielder Joel Barlow who easily finished past the Lincoln keeper. However, as often happens in football Carre's quickly let this lead slip as a Lincoln Midfielder equalised with a neat finish. Not as attractive as the previous Carre's goal but certainly just as important. Carres were starting to dominate now and were looking dangerous every time they pressed forward. Carre's had numerous playmakers in their team, but a lot of the action was going through Bryan and Barlow. However, it was Liam Atkins who set up Bryans 2nd and Carre's 4th goal when he played a chipped pass through which allowed Bryan to race through and lob the on rushing keeper with ease. Carre's were only ever under pressure when they made mistakes, and when a ball wasn't cleared from the edge of their box Lincoln had a great chance to pull a goal back, but fortunately for Carres the finish was put wide. Carre's finally wrapped up the game in the final few minutes when good play from Julio Galaragga in midfield gave Josh Bryan the chance for a hat trick.
