The lads turned up in Mansfield and were made to get changed in what could be called a sauna. Whittaker tried to break the half way line but couldn't cope with the strong wind. The half time whistle was blown. The coaches were happy with the performance so far but believed we could have taken more advantage of the wind. No changes were made and the second half went underway and the wind seemed in Whittaker's favour seemed to help Carre's more. It suited their style of getting the ball down and passing. The boys worked the ball decisively, instantly Crampton whipped a ball across the 6 yard box, a better ball and Thompson would have been on the end of it. A Corner was won on 55 minutes and the first average ball by Crampton was met by the hound like Thompson, 3 - 0. On 60 minutes Braithwaite and Allen in the centre of the park began to feel the pressure by the opposing CMs, first touches were lacklustre and intelligence was lacking, the structure was lost and Whittaker started to play keeping the ball well and creating chances, the wind taking the pace off most shots helped Tomlinson a great deal between the sticks.
