After watching the year 12's tense tied ball game, the year 11's stepped out onto the floor to face Pycok's Boston team. Lambert, Starbuck, Regan, Goacher and year 9 Mayfield, who was thrown in at the deep end, as starting point guard faced up against the tall Boston team. Lambert, proudly wearing the number 69 jersey, lost the tip off but Boston failed to capitalise on their possession and the ball ended up with Carre's who set off like a steam train and out-scored the opposition 16 – 6 after the first quarter thanks to strong offensive plays from Lambert and a great team effort on the defensive end. Carre's travelled to Boston with high expectations. The team was training well and the coaching team of Mr. Newell and Mr. Wilkinson seemed to lift the morale. In the friendly in September when Boston came to Carre's, they won 3-0. However, since that game, Carre's have improved. With a steady defence, a skilful midfield and a lightening quick attacking force, the Carre's side looked good.

COXWELL CHALLENGE

Coxwell Challenge is an event that has been a great success at the school. All age groups were invited to this event and so far the Y7 & Y8 groups have taken part.

Basically, Coxwell Challenge is a 4 man team rowing competition. It happens in the Sports Hall using the indoor rowing machines from the fitness suite. Competitors have to use the machines as normal, pulling back the handlebar instead of an oar in unison with the sliding seat that goes backwards and forwards. For Y7's, it is set on level 5, Y8's level 6 and so on. The whole row lasts for 8 minutes so each person does 2 minutes each. After every 30 second row, there is a change over with the current rower and the next rower. After the 8 minutes, the final reading in metres is found on the digital panel on the machine.

Here are few tips to help with a few hard points:

You have to be balanced correctly on the seat otherwise you can fall off and lose precious time.

Competitors who are not rowing should hold the current rowers feet firmly in place to stop him from moving out of position.

During the change over, the handle bar should be held on to as it can spring wildly out of place and time could be wasted fumbling for it.

When it is nearly your turn to row, be ready so you can change over as quickly as possible.

If these tips are taken into consideration, your team could just be the winning formula! Also, cheer your team mates on. Support can do a lot of good. The scores from the school are submitted to a county league. Lots of schools around Lincolnshire are taken part in Coxwell Challenge. In Y8, the top score was just less than 2000 metres which is pretty impressive!
