Year 11 Storm to County Cup Victory

Carre's Grammar School (2) - (0) The Priory Academy LSST

After a tough semi-final encounter with Boston Grammar, Carre's U16s found themselves up against Priory Academy LSST in the County Cup Final at Fulbeck United. Lincolnshire had only been granted one entry into the National Cup this season, which gave the match even more of a competitive edge, with only the winners progressing.

Despite heavy rain the previous night, the pitch was declared fit on the morning of the game, and the boys arrived at the ground quietly confident that they could emulate their success in Year 9 by becoming County Champions.

From the first whistle it became clear that this was going to be a tough game, with the opposition boasting several good attacking players. After a nervy opening 10 minutes, Carre's began to settle, and they had a good chance to take the lead when Adam Mercer shot narrowly over. LSST began to put together a few attacks of their own, but the central defensive partnership of Thacker and Cobb dealt well with the lively opposition strikers.

Carre's made their first change midway through the first-half when Bee was replaced at right back by Sam Garwood after suffering a painful blow to the knee. Garwood soon settled into his new role, and his link up play with Nurse on the right flank was a feature throughout the match.

As the half progressed, Carre's gradually began to stamp their authority on proceedings. The defence continued to look solid; Hales began pulling the strings in midfield and Mercer's pace and power provided a constant threat in attack, particularly when combined with some nice touches from Shores. The deadlock was finally broken when Carre's took a deserved lead just before half-time with the industrious Price firing home from the edge of the area to the delight of his team-mates.

The second-half followed a similar pattern to the first, with Carre's edging the possession and creating the better chances. LSST continued to put together some good moves of their own.

A two-goal cushion was established early in the half when Rossington arrowed the ball into the roof of the net from twenty yards out with his right foot. Defence started in attack, with substitutes Seabrook and Harling and target man Mercer constantly pressurising the opposition defence. The midfield was disciplined, with Nurse and Rossington working back to protect their full-backs (the dependable duo of Garwood and Britten) and Price and Hales continuing to dominate the central areas. The defence remained impenetrable, with Thacker winning everything in the air and Cobb making several perfectly-timed tackles. When LSST did manage to get a shot on goal, the Carre's keeper Dales dealt confidently with the danger, most notably when he flung himself low to his left to keep out a well-struck free-kick.

After what seemed like an eternity, the final whistle blew and Carre's were crowned U16 County Champions. Captain Frazer Cobb lifted the trophy to signal the start of the next challenge - the National Cup.

Story of Lance Armstrong

At age 25, Lance Armstrong (pictured left) was an invincible sporting phenomenon, winning the World Championships, the Tour Du Pont and multiple Tour de France stages. Then, Lance's life changed as he was diagnosed with the most common form of male (aged 15-35) cancer, testicular cancer: sport suddenly became insignificant. However, if detected early, its cure rate is more than 90 percent of males. Lance ignored the warning signs, failing to imagine the seriousness of testicular cancer until it spread to his abdomen, lungs and brain.

Lance regards himself as a cancer survivor, rather than a victim and undergoing aggressive treatment finally beat the disease. During his treatment, he became an advocate for cancer survivors by creating the Lance Armstrong Foundation.

His sporting achievements are profound and inspiring, but the battle against cancer has proven to be his greatest challenge. Lance has become a world representative for all cancer survivors and for all those who fail to imagine this every happening to them. "This is his choice to live strong".

Premature End to National Cup Campaign

Kings Lynn School (1) Vs (0) Carre's Grammar School

On a cold, damp Wednesday afternoon, Carre's 1st XI travelled to Kings Lynn School in Norfolk for a place in the last 32 of the National Cup. Convincing victories in previous rounds resulted in heightened feelings of optimism and a strong belief in the qualities the team boast. Nevertheless, it was clear that Kings Lynn would be the toughest test yet. After an inspirational team talk from Mr Wilkinson, Mr Allen took the team through a thorough warm up. The pitch was a short, wide playing area and its flat surface encouraged 'free flowing football'.

The game kicked off with both teams clearly showing a determination to win the ball and this competitive style of play continued throughout the game. The first goal came after just 10 minutes, with Kings Lynn unfortunately taking the lead with a controversial header on goal with the striker planting both hands in Harding's back as he climbed to meet the oncoming ball. Carre's were aggrieved with the decision, but their disappointment was transferred into their determined team effort. Carre's pressed for a goal with Kings Lynn showing resilience in defence and thwarting any efforts on goal. The first half ended 1-0.

As the second half started, Carre's came 'out of the blocks' quickly and pressed for an equaliser. Carre's looked increasingly steady at the back and frustration began to rise. Then, after 15 minutes of the second half, Carre's pressed with good work down the left wing. The ball was whipped in with Smith getting on the end 4 yards from goal, forcing a point-blank save from the opposing goal keeper in what can only be described a clear goal scoring opportunity. Top draw defending from both teams ensured that the game remained very close and difficult to call. With 15 minutes remaining, Vertigan entered the field of play and sparked a surge in enthusiasm throughout the team, who now also had the 2nd XI supporting their peers from the sideline. Lambert then replaced Thacker in central midfield to sit in front of the defence and win balls in the air in anticipation that this may provide opportunities for Greenwood and Ward up-front.

With five minutes remaining, Carre's won a free kick 18 yards from goal. Vertigan struck a clean effort which was superbly tipped around the post by the in-form Kings Lynn goalkeeper who was determined to keep a clean sheet. Frustration continued to mount on Carre's XI, exemplified when the referee called a 50:50 decision in favour of Kings Lynn and Bicknell voiced his frustration in the direction of the officials, receiving a red card for his involvement. Pollard was then added to the book soon after, again frustrated with the teams failure to equalise.



The game finished 1-0. Carre's were evidently disappointed with the result, but could be very proud of their effort, determination and team spirit that have provided so many victories throughout the academic year to date.

Kings Lynn School Held by 2nd XI

Carre's 2nd XI travelled to Kings Lynn School in Norfolk to play a team who boasted convincing victories in the league with a 100% win ratio prior to the game. Leadenham Polo Club

This year we are starting our "Schools Polo Programme" aimed at making this great sport much more widely available and accessible to school children. Polo is without doubt one of the most exciting games imaginable, and at Leadenham we have created a high quality facility in order to do it justice.

When mastered it is a fast, high adrenaline contact sport involving quick reactions and lots of energy. It is also very easy to take up. There is no riding experience needed, and the polo ponies at Leadenham have been specially bred and trained for the sport. They were handpicked for the club in Argentina by England player Henry Brett, and range from very docile which the most timid fledgling rider will rapidly feel at ease on, to more challenging ponies for the bolder or more experienced.

Polo is now played regularly by dozens of schools around the country who compete at annual national tournaments. The schools polo programme at Leadenham aims to provide a structure and format for schools in this region to take up the sport, play it regularly to improve, and to organise matches and tournaments between the schools in the region as well as getting them competing on a national level.

The idea is for each school to have an hour's session at the same time every week, with groups of between 8-10 (at £35/head). Depending on the numbers wishing to be involved from each school, it may be that students alternate each week so that more can take part. During these sessions pupils will learn the essence of good horsemanship in a relaxed and fun environment taught by Mark Holmes, our experienced professional player and instructor. The aim will be to build on these skills towards becoming fully-fledged polo players. Polo is a mixed sport, so girls and boys can play on the same teams as well as against each other. As the programme develops we will organise competitions between schools from across the region to bring them together both on and off the polo ground.
