On Monday 25th November, eight boys travelled to Coventry to represent the school in the Midlands regional final of the Kids Lit Quiz. This annual event is a literature quiz for students aged 10 to 13. Quizzes are held in New Zealand, South Africa, Canada, China, USA, Singapore, Hong Kong and the UK. Teams of four pupils are asked to answer 100 questions about classic and contemporary children's literature over ten themed rounds. The competition is hosted by New Zealand quizmaster and keen reader Wayne Mills who writes several thousand questions each year. The winning team from each heat competes in a national final with the national champions representing their country in the world final.

This year was the first time Carre's had entered the competition. The team members were selected following two rounds of competition in school. Our representatives were Travis Cullum, James Pratt, Robert Pratt and Sam Mountford (Team 1), Alan Cave, James McHenry, Finley Saxby and Robert Thompson (Team 2) and they were accompanied by Mrs James and Mrs Lilliman.

Our boys performed very well in the quiz and at the half way stage we were



in 4th place with 5 points separating the top 5 teams. The second round saw Carre's Grammar School Team 1 shine as winners in the Mythology round of questions. After 10 rounds of competition our teams scored 61 and 56 respectively which meant our school finished 5th and 7th

from approximately 30 teams.

Cookery

Christmas Cookery at Carre's

When selecting recipes for cookery lessons Mrs Livsey has to ensure they can be made in an hour. The room and equipment all have to be cleaned up in that time too. The boys in year 7 have been cooking this delicious, but quick recipe recently and the air has been filled with a very Christmassy smell. If you need a quick festive recipe, why not have a go?

Mince Pie Pinwheels

Ingredients:

1 sheet ready rolled puff pastry
300g mincemeat.

To glaze:

Beaten egg.

Method:

Line baking tray with baking parchment.

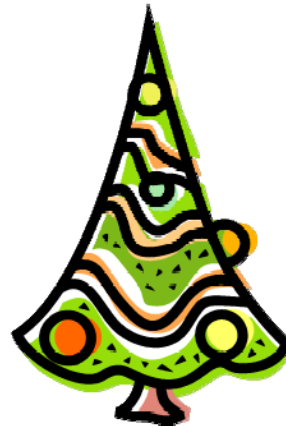
Preheat electric oven 220°C, fan oven to 200°C, gas mark 7.

Unroll pastry and spread mincemeat evenly over pastry. With longside nearest to you, roll up like a Swiss roll.

Using a sharp knife cut into slices approximately 3.5cm thick and lay cut side down on lined baking sheet. Brush around outside edges with beaten egg and bake for 12-15 minutes, until pastry is puffed and golden brown.

Allow to cool slightly before transferring to plate for serving. (Take care - filling will be very hot!).

Drizzle with glaze icing or dust lightly with icing sugar before serving, if liked.



Drama

This term, Ms Cain directed an abridged version of Julius Caesar in the Drama Studio and Head's Garden which was entered for the Shakespeare Schools Festival. The highlights included Edward Bower's (Year 11) performance as Mark Antony, Tadhg Camm (Year 8) as Julius Caesar, Travis Cullum (Year 8) as Brutus and Mark Heads (Year 9) as Casca. Daniel Raymen (Year 9) also did very well as Cassius, with an enormous number of lines. Students from different age groups contributed to the stage, lighting and choreography to produce an excellent show that around 100 people saw over two nights.



Ms Cain took all Year 10 and 11 GCSE Drama students on a trip to see 'Richard II'. The students enjoyed the visit and loved David Tennant's performance. The boys all felt that it was far more beneficial to see the real performance rather than a live streaming.

Students have been rehearsing for several weeks for 'Jack and the Beantin' pantomime and 'Fawlty Towers' which were prepared for the Community Christmas lunch (report on page 13). 'Jack' was directed by Jake Young (Year 12). 'Fawlty Towers' was performed by Year 11 Drama students.

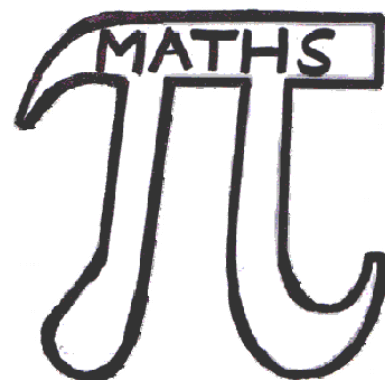


Achievements

The official description of why I was nominated for 'Lincolnshire young sports volunteer of the year' is: *'A key member of the volunteer team at the last two Lincolnshire School Games. Supported the Activity Marketplace as a Young Leader in March 2013 and was the outstanding volunteer in the team. Volunteered as a Young Ambassador at the July 2013 event again supporting the Activity Marketplace, this time taking a more active role in leading and supervising a challenging group of younger students throughout the whole day. Oscar also played an active role in the set up and takedown of the event showing a fantastic attitude throughout and being an invaluable asset to the team.'*

I believe I was nominated is because of my work at the 'Sainsbury's Lincolnshire school summer games' where I was supporting Marc Rhodes who was activities marketplace team leader. Myself, as a young ambassador, and Marc were in charge of the activities marketplace which involved setting up, putting away and running ten activities for young people to participate in, including mini tennis and giant table football. We were also responsible for four young sports leaders who it assisted with the marketplace.

Lincolnshire Sports Awards

In November Chris (Year 10) attended the Lincolnshire Sports Awards after being nominated for Young Sportsman of the Year. Chris was a runner-up on the night but it was an honour to be nominated. Here is some of his story.

Chris has had a successful first year competing in adult sprint triathlons as well as youth events. As a result of when his birthday falls, he has had to compete in the 15-19 age group, despite being 14 for the majority of events.

He competed against Oxford and Cambridge students at Grendon triathlon (who used it as their inter university competition), his finishing position qualifying him to represent Great Britain in his age group at the 2014 European Championships to be held in Kitzbuhel, June 2014.

Chris competed in three qualifying triathlons in the East Midlands Sprint Series. He was second in the Woodhall Spa tri in his age group and this put him second overall in the series (in his age). He did the 6th fastest run at Woodhall Spa out of 566 adult competitors.

Chris captained an adult team at The Triathlon England Club Relay Championships at The National Watersports Centre, Nottingham (beating his Dad's team).

In September he won the youth event at the triathlon organised by his club, Lincoln Tri, attended by children from across the country. In adult races Chris came first at The Eaton Stampede ¹⁵ and fourth at the Nottingham Spooky 10k in October.

Arkwright Engineering Scholarships

Kieran Boyle, Jonathan Gilmore and Oscar White

As reported earlier in the year, Kieran Boyle, Jonathan Gilmore and Oscar White were each awarded a prestigious Arkwright Engineering Scholarship that identifies them as being amongst the country's future leaders in engineering and related areas of design. In 2013, 1271 applied (with endorsements from teachers), 580 candidates reached the final interview stage and 350 Engineering Scholarships were awarded. Kieran, Jonathan and Oscar had to successfully complete a rigorous selection process consisting of a detailed application form, a two-hour aptitude exam and an interview hosted at a top engineering university.

The aptitude exam tested candidates' flair and originality in solving engineering design problems. At the in-depth interview, candidates were asked about their career aspirations and had to discuss an engineering project they had conducted.

During the interview day the candidates took part in a team exercise to solve a hands-on engineering problem working with students they had never met before. Candidates and their parents also toured the engineering facilities at the host university and explored the diversity of engineering and design careers and their importance to the UK economy.

The Scholarships were formally presented at a prestigious ceremony supported by the Institute of Engineering and Technology.



With the competition for rewarding jobs becoming even more fierce, the receipt of an Arkwright Scholarship can help dynamic young people at the start of their journey to be the country's future leaders in engineering and related areas of design.

Charity Events

In addition to the record total raised by the sponsored walk, students and staff have participated in a range of charity fundraising activities this term.

This year, Children in Need took place on Friday 15th November. Carre's Grammar School students and staff were encouraged to wear non-uniform with many choosing to wear spots like Pudsey. £800 was raised on the day.
