This has been a term like no other in recent years. Following the Christmas break we had to come to terms with the tragic circumstances of the death of Andrew Rees in Year 7. We have a commitment to support his brother, David, who remains at the school in Year 10. Every bereavement is filled with sorrow and, although all of us who have been bereaved know of the pain that is experienced, few can imagine the emotions resulting from the complexity of the circumstances that face those closest to the Rees family.

I know that David, together with Beryl and Peter Marsh, Andrew and David's grandparents, would wish to thank the many who have expressed their condolences and desire to support through the future.

I am sure that we all will understand David's wish to continue with the greatest sense of normality at school. I can assure you that he has the strong support of close family and friends as well as the school community.

In any community, there are a number of people who miss loved ones and friends, especially at the anniversaries of special times, yet we have little physical provision at the current time. Following meetings with Andrew's form, 7L, and chatting to others, I should wish to launch over the next three months, a fund to create a quiet space within the school grounds. This will be a garden where any student may spend time in reflection and thought. We would wish this to be a place that belongs to us all that remember both those whom we all know, such as Andrew, but also to be a special place to remember those whose memories are more specific to the individual. If you wish to support the project, I should be pleased to accept any donations, addressing the donation to the School Bursar. Please mark your envelope "The Garden Project".

May I take this opportunity to also introduce you to three recent appointments to the school. On 9 and 10 February we interviewed for the re-establishing of the post of Deputy Headteacher. For two years we have operated without this position to afford the associated costs of dramatic increases in the ICT provision within the school. Mrs Yvonne Green has been appointed to the post. Mrs Green is currently employed as an Advanced Skills Teacher and Assistant Headteacher at Boston High School. A number of students may remember her as a member of the Carre's History Department before she was promoted to The Priory LSST and then to Boston. We look forward to welcoming her after the Easter holiday.

Following Mike Swaby's impeccable oversight of the school's finances and site, he is moving to part-time employment within Carre's to assist in the settling in of the new Bursar who was appointed recently. Mrs Val Andrew joins Carre's in March with experience in both the primary and secondary environment of Grantham.

To support students and teachers with responsibilities within the school, Mrs Pam Watson will join us as Student Support Assistant after the February holiday. Mrs Watson is currently employed in a similar role in a school in North East Lincolnshire.

All three of these positions reflect the important changes to staffing that were agreed with the Governing Body as a result of a nationwide examination of school staffing structures. We took the opportunity to make changes to support your son even more richly than the structure that had received warm praise.

Following our investment in a new IT management tool, Year 11 reports have been written using this new system. We are planning further improvements, but I would be particularly interested to hear of your impressions.

## Mobile Phones

- Are allowed in School, but are the student's responsibility
- Can only be used at breaktimes and lunchtimes - not between lessons
- At all other times mobile phones must be switched off
- Inappropriate use of mobile phones, i.e. texting/photos for bullying purposes, will lead to confiscation and implementation of bullying procedures
- Penalties: First time - confiscated: to be collected at 3 45 from school office  
Second and subsequent times - confiscated: parents to collect



## MP3 Players

- Allowed in school, but are the student's responsibility
- Can only be used at breaktimes and lunchtimes - not between lessons
- Only one ear plug in at a time
- Can be used in lessons, but **only** at the discretion of the teacher
- Can be used in private study time in the Library, provided it does not disturb other students and staff, and subject to the third item above concerning one ear.
- Penalties: First time - confiscated: to be collected at 3 45 from school office  
Second and subsequent times - confiscated: parents to collect

## PSP (Play Station Portable) and Nintendo Dual Screen

- **Not allowed in school**, because they interfere with school wireless network
- Penalties: First time - confiscated: to be collected at 3 45 from school office  
Second and subsequent times - confiscated: parents to collect

- **James Wathen** came third in the Under 13 National Bi-athlon.
- **James Shacklock** is in the top 5 national tennis rankings in his age group.
- **Robert McDonald** was joint 18<sup>th</sup> in his age group at the European Speed Skating Championships.
- **Patrick Owen** came 43<sup>rd</sup> in the Great Britain 10-mile cycling time trial (only 6 months after taking up the sport!)
- **Tom Bond** came 20<sup>th</sup> in the Under 13 section of the British Indoor Rowing Championships 2005.
- **Sam Wright** is a swimmer for the Midlands Region.
- **Sam Mason** came 9<sup>th</sup> in the England Under 16 Golf Championships, when he was 11! He has also played in the Nick Faldo Series.

# Key Stage 3 Updates

## Progress Grades

Several parents have requested clarification regarding the target grades that have been set for the students in each subject. For Key Stage 3 students (Years 7-9) the grade represents the National Curriculum level each student is expected to reach by the end of Year 9. The national average for achievement at the end of Year 9 is Level 5. However, in the context of a selective grammar school, the average achievement for most students is Level 6. Level 7 and 8 therefore represent an above average achievement. Each level is subdivided into a, b and c, with c being within the lower range of achievement for each level. We would expect to review targets as the students progress through the key stage.

We plan to review the new system towards the end of the first annual cycle and expect to involve parents in this process. Mr John Garnett is currently chairing the working party on Progress Grades.

We would like to thank parents for their support in reinforcing our expectations with regard to our dress code. The boys responded with a positive spirit of co-operation and some even underwent transformations that caused us to wonder if new boys had joined our ranks!


## Remember a Star with a Star


Well done Matt, we are very proud of your public spirited attitude and you are a credit to the school.
