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Foreword by Mr Law, Headteacher

Welcome to the first newsletter of the new academic year; I hope that you have all had a good summer. A warm welcome to all of our new parents and students, and we look forward to working with you over the coming years.

Public Exam Success

We are delighted with this year's **A Level** results as the students achieved a 100% pass rate, with 9 students achieving at least 3 A*/ A grades in their subjects. A Levels remain the gold standard of what you can achieve in school and this is the first year's results for the reformed A Levels in many subjects. The exams are getting tougher, yet our results maintained the excellent standards of the previous years. We are very proud of our students for whom it is a fantastic achievement. Some students have also achieved excellent results on their vocational courses, sitting alongside the more traditional A Levels. This demonstrates the strength of the collaboration between the staff of the Sleaford Joint Sixth Form and the success of developing teaching that supports students and encourages the independent learning, a skill that is required in many walks of life. Challenging subjects continue to be taken by our students and they achieve highly in these areas, allowing them to access courses at some of the country's top universities, including Cambridge University. The majority of students have secured places at their chosen universities, whilst others have been successful in being selected for prestigious apprenticeships.



The **AS results** for our Year 12 students were excellent with students setting excellent foundations for the second year of their A Level studies. Following the recent A Level reforms this is the second year that AS Levels have been split from A Levels in some subjects and consequently the marks achieved at AS in those subjects will no longer count towards the final A Level grade. The task for teachers and students has been to acquaint themselves with the new content and assessment and they have done remarkably well. This is the last year that students will be taking AS examinations as they shall pursue linear courses.

With the **GCSE** exams it has been yet another successful year for our Year 11 students at Carre's, with 95% of the students securing 5 A* - C grades or their equivalent. There has been much talk in the media recently about the exams, with the introduction of more rigorous course content and new grades, and they have undoubtedly become tougher, so we are delighted that the efforts of our students, staff and the support of parents have been rewarded by such good results. We pride ourselves on teaching beyond the exam requirements at GCSE, on not 'spoon-feeding' our students, while also enabling them to engage in a very busy programme of enrichment activities, which see Carre's students moving on to the next level, be it to do A Levels, BTEC diplomas, college courses, apprenticeships or employment, and this is cause for celebration. Some individuals have overcome considerable challenges to achieve their results and I am very proud of each and every one of them.

The results are a testament to the hard work and motivation of the students, alongside support from their teachers and parents. Students have worked hard over their time at the school with staff, who also deserve much praise for the support, encouragement, quality of teaching and many extra hours they have put in with the students.

Sleaford Castle

On Thursday 13 July, 7C had the opportunity to share the work they have been doing on Sleaford Castle with Sleaford's Mayor, members of the Town Council, and representatives from Historic England and Heritage Lincolnshire. Students presented their ideas of how they think Sleaford Castle could be improved so that people could understand what the castle would have looked like and some of the stories of the people who



lived and stayed there including King John and Henry VIII. Some of the ideas the visitors liked included noticeboards with artist reconstructions as well as text, a museum where the medieval barn once stood and VR headsets.

All students received a Heritage Schools Achievement certificate and goodie bag for their hard work and the school was awarded Heritage School status for the work that the History Department has done in promoting local history in the school and in other local schools.

Sleaford Castle



On Friday 9 June we were joined by Dr Ian Marshman on a visit to Sleaford castle. As we explored the site Dr Marshman explained what the earthworks we could see would have been and we used our knowledge of castles to try and imagine what Sleaford castle would have looked like before it was sold off and dismantled for building materials used around the town. As well as looking at the earthworks we measured the only remaining visible part of the castle - part of the corner tower. We also measured the size of the hall by measuring the length and width of the earthworks.

As we walked around the site we thought about how it could be made more interesting for the public. Following our visit Lincoln castle on 23 June we are going to present our ideas to representatives from the Town Council, Heritage Lincolnshire and Mr Law.

On our way back to school we tried to spot examples of medieval stones used in the buildings we passed. We also took lots of photos of the site and are going to use these to 'Enrich the List' which is an English Heritage initiative to share knowledge about local historic buildings and sites.

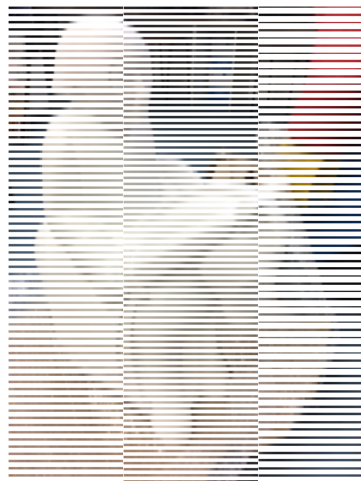


Art

Josh Newman - Carre's Grammar Schoolboy Wins Bronze at the 2017 World Angling Championships in Ireland

Josh Newman and Team England U15s competed for the first time in the World Championships on Inniscarra Lake in Ireland.

After an exhausting six day official practise regime in Ireland the final Under 15 four man team was selected consisting of Josh Newman, Billy Kirk, Ryan Kennison and William McCranor. The event took place on 12 and 13 August against the 10 best teams from across the world and after a solid day fishing, catching roach, the team were lying in silver medal position with the French team leading and Poland in bronze.

On the second day Team England drew a couple of very hard pegs but managed to stay consistent and ended the day in joint silver position with Poland but lost out on a weight countback putting them in bronze medal position.

The team manager, Joe Roberts, was extremely pleased as this was the first time the English team had fished international rules and to come away with a medal at their first attempt was amazing. The established England Under 20 and Under 25s both finished in 4th place showing what a competitive competition it was this year and highlighting how well the U15 team had performed.

Joshua was absolutely delighted to be part of the team and formed relationships in the team that will strengthen the squad for future years and was proud to represent his country at such a young age. Josh will now be entering international rule senior matches to improve his abilities with an aim to make the future Under 20 England squad.

Every effort will be made to provide quality experiences for students and teachers using this information service. Inappropriate and/or illegal interaction with any information service is strictly prohibited.

If British decency laws are breached or the Computer Misuse Act 1990 is breached then a student is likely to have the matter referred to other authorities including the police. The Computer Misuse Act 1990 identifies three specific offences:

1. Unauthorised access to computer material (that is, a program or data).
2. Unauthorised access to a computer system with intent to commit or facilitate the commission of a serious crime.
3. Unauthorised modification of computer material.

Premises

Although budgetary constraints have curtailed any major refurbishment, the programme of re-decoration has continued throughout the school, as we take great pride in creating the best learning environment possible. Room 7 (Science) has been given a makeover and additional IT facilities have been installed in the Sixth Form Work room and the Conference Room.

Sponsored Walk 2017

School Term Dates and Holidays

We would respectfully request that holidays are not taken during term time and requests will not normally be authorised, except in exceptional circumstances. Please use the form on the website when making such requests. We look at each request on a case-by-case basis and nationally, Government policy is to encourage schools to minimise the amount of teaching and learning time lost as a result of term-time holidays.

Parents' Cars on the School Site

May we remind parents that for safety reasons we do not allow the dropping off of students on the school site after 8am. Similarly, in the afternoons, parents should not bring cars onto the site before 4.30pm.

Safeguarding

Parents of boys in Years 7-11 wishing to take their son out of school during the day should report to the school reception where their son will be handed over by office staff. This procedure is to make sure that boys are safely delivered to their parents.

Cashless Catering

Cashless catering is in place in the school's Dining Hall ('The Chill'). Please could parents ensure that sufficient funds are uploaded onto ParentPay for their child's lunches. You should be aware that overdrafts are not permitted except in extreme circumstances.

Lost Property

On the last day of each term we have a Lost Property amnesty. All unmarked property is put out for students to recognise and claim. Any unclaimed items after the amnesty are given to charity. It would be most helpful if your child's property is named as this makes it easier to hand back property which is often claimed to have been 'stolen', when, in the majority of cases, it has been left unwittingly somewhere in the school.

Payment for Trips

The preferred method of payment for all school trips is via ParentPay and this has been extended to include payments for Music tuition. If you would rather pay via an alternative method, please contact the Finance Office.

Trip Refunds

We try to keep the cost of trips to a minimum, but sometimes there is a small surplus. Where this is the case the balance will be paid directly to the student's ParentPay account, unless requested otherwise.

Wireless Network and Mobile Devices

There is a wireless network throughout the school. This is to help with administration, but, more importantly, with teaching and learning. We witnessed the benefits for the Sixth Form students who use their own devices, largely for research and accessing online resources, and have rolled this out to the whole school. Mobile phones may be used for this purpose only during lessons, with the teacher's permission, and as previously, breaches of this will result in the phone being confiscated and being made available for return at the school office at the end of the day. Should this happen a second time, parents will be required to collect the phone in person from the school office.



The school cannot accept responsibility for any loss or damage of personal devices.

Uniform and Appearance

We have a formal uniform which reflects the traditions of the school and our policy in school uniform is stated in the prospectus and on the school website. We expect our students to maintain high standards of dress during the school day and also when travelling to and from school. This means that shirts/blouses should be tucked in, for boys top buttons should be done up and blazers/jackets should be worn. Hooded tops are not part of our uniform, and neither are extreme hairstyles. For boys, piercing is not permitted, and they should be clean shaven. The dress code is also intended to respect cultural sensitivities. If there are any concerns, please contact the appropriate Head of Year.

School uniform should include:

- Black trousers (not excessively flared or too narrow)
- Grey or black socks
- Black formal shoes (suede or trainer style is not acceptable)

3G Pitch

Having such a superb facility available for the school to use has only been possible thanks to large investment, so it is no surprise that our funding partners hold us accountable for how it is used. In order to protect the 8 year guarantee, we must ensure that it is managed appropriately. This includes ensuring all users wear appropriate footwear during lessons and recreational time.

It is essential that students only use the pitch with suitable, **clean**, footwear. Flat shoes (including some trainers) damage the carpet fibres so **must not** be worn. Football boots are the best! As part of school uniform requirements, students should already have a pair of football boots for outdoor PE. A poster is up by the main gate to help everyone understand what is suitable.

Behaviour on Contract Transport

Despite frequent reminders of our expectations, we are always concerned about any unsatisfactory behaviour on the journeys to and from school. We would be grateful if you would reinforce our expectations by reminding your son about the importance of remaining seated during the journey. Behaviour such as shouting or throwing objects is clearly unacceptable. All students sign a code of conduct regarding travel which makes it clear that poor behaviour may result in a ban from using school transport.



Students also need to be aware of the local residents when they are waiting for a school bus. One resident reported an amount of rubbish left near the Gregson Green grassed area: bottles, cans, food wrappers, ice cream papers etc. The resident reported that students often have no regard for standing aside for Ashfield Road pedestrians. Good manners are expected from all our students, especially when off site.

Internal Examinations

As a school, we feel that it is important that during their time at Carre's the students build up experience of the formal examination process to prepare for the external public examinations taken in Years 11 and 13. For the students this will be an opportunity to prepare for assessments that cover a larger body of work than those they might do as part of their normal studies, and they should take note of the advice and guidance provided by their subject teachers in terms of revision and exam techniques.

Your son/daughter should view these exams as an opportunity to see how successful their revision and learning techniques are and how effectively they are able to cope with the examination process. He or she should, therefore, spend time revising actively to ensure that effective and efficient revision techniques for the exams in each subject area are in place.

- Exams for students in Years 7 and 8 will take place during week commencing Monday 25 June 2018.
- Exams for Year 9 students will take place during week commencing Monday 19 March 2018.
- Exams for students in Year 10 will take place during the weeks commencing 16 and 23 April 2018.
- GCSE mock examinations for Year 11 students will take place during the weeks commencing 20 and 27 November 2017.
- Year 12 examinations will take place during week commencing Monday 30 April 2018.
- Year 13 examinations will take place during week commencing Monday 29 January 2018.

Free School Meals

Parents do not have to pay for school lunches if they receive any of the following:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The Guarantee element of State Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, provided they are not entitled to Working Tax Credit* and have an annual household income (as assessed by HM Revenue & Customs) that does not exceed £16,190
- Universal Credit

*unless in the Working Tax Credit 'run on' - the payment someone may receive for a further four weeks after they stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit.

Students who receive any of the qualifying benefits listed above in their own right are also eligible to receive free school meals.

What if my circumstances change?

You should notify the school:

- if you start work and come off benefits
- if you change address
- if your child changes school

How to apply

If you would like to apply for Free School Meals please complete the registration form available from the school office or via the school website. The person who is in receipt of the qualifying benefit will need to complete the form and you will be asked to complete your full name, date of birth and National Insurance number. If appropriate, it is recommended that both parents' information is provided.
