

A 4 B 6 C 8 D 10 E 12


Students were not allowed a calculator for this challenge so it all had to be done using either written methods or mentally.

Oscar Talbot received both the best score in Year 8 and the best score in the school receiving a Gold Certificate. William Speight achieved the best score in Year 7 along with a Gold Certificate.

In total three Year 8 boys and two Year 7 boys received a Gold Certificate; eleven Year 8 boys and seven Year 7 boys received a Silver Certificate and nineteen Year 8 boys and nine Year 7 boys received a Bronze Certificate.

On Monday 21 May, the Year 10 History groups went on our GCSE fieldtrip to Lincoln. We started the day with a lecture by Dr Griggs and then split up into groups to explore Roman Lincoln. The first surprise was a trip to Posterngate - we went through a very ordinary door at the back of the Royal Bank of Scotland and found ourselves face to face with a Roman gateway. We could even see the groove in the floor created by the door being opened and closed every day over 1700 years ago. We also found out about the earliest cockroach to have been excavated just metres from where we stood!

We also had the opportunity to look round the Collection museum and to handle some Roman artefacts. There were lots of tombstones that told us about where people from Roman Lincoln had originally come from as well as mosaics, statues and weapons.

After lunch in the sunshine we headed off for a tour round the remains of Roman Lincoln expertly guided by our teachers. We saw the highest non-defensive Roman wall in Britain (the Mint Wall), the only Roman gateway still used by traffic in Britain (Newport Arch) and the remains of the amazing Upper Southgate which was the only gateway with magnificent steps north of the Alps in Roman times. Everyone had a good day and learned lots to help us with our GCSE exam next summer.

Lessons from Auschwitz

On 8 March, after a detailed seminar, four Carre's sixth formers, including myself, travelled to Poland with many other students from around the East Midlands as part of a visit arranged by the Holocaust Educational Trust to visit the sites of Auschwitz 1 and 2 where roughly 1.3 million people were killed between 1941 and 1945. In a previous seminar, we had been educated on the importance of the individual when studying the Holocaust, and how while it is easy to remember 6 million people died, what is much harder to realise is that all of these 6 million were individuals with their own stories and lives that were snatched away. This included listening to the story of a survivor of the Holocaust who came in to speak to us which was a horrifying testament to the atrocities of the Holocaust.



On our trip to Poland, we saw many haunting things around the two sites which have been preserved to this day to serve as a lesson to all who see it. While going around the two sites, we saw things such as the Book of Names, a book spanning a room filled only with 4.5 million names of all the known victims of the Holocaust. Also horrifying sights such as entire rooms filled with the shoes of victims and their shaven hair that the Nazis had taken away from

the Jews who went to Auschwitz. We also visited the original gas chamber on the site which was a harrowing experience, before moving on to Auschwitz 2. Here, the Nazis had built a far bigger camp to increase the scale of the Holocaust. We went into the inhuman conditions the Jews were kept in here and looked at the two, much larger, gas chambers on the site. What was truly horrifying about Auschwitz 2 was the sheer scale as it stretched on and on. At the end of the trip, as we were about to leave, a Jewish priest (rabbi) who had come with us, gave us some parting messages. He told us how these sites stood as a memorial yet also a warning. The perpetrators were human too, showing the destructive potential of humanity. He told us a story of Jews being harassed on the streets, a story which belonged in the 1930s and 40s yet occurred in Edinburgh in 2017. He said anti-Semitism, racism and hate still exist today through society and that it was our job to stop it if we see it, before it grows and spreads like a cancer. He stressed to us the importance of education, the light against the dark and it was to this end that after attending another seminar to allow us to reflect on what we had experienced, all four of us went back to Carre's and taught several classes of Year 9s about what we had seen and learnt. For this, I spent some time researching one of the names I had seen within the Book of Names and used their life story as an activity to stress the individuality of the Holocaust to the attentive class.

The four of us were really thrilled at how willing and interested the classes were to learn. The importance of sites such as Auschwitz is undeniable as it really brought home the shocking messages of the Holocaust. It is impossible to fully explain what we experienced whilst at those haunting sites, except that it was a fantastic trip in the worst possible way.

'Festivals of Chemistry' Competition



On Tuesday 5 June, myself along with three other students from Year 8 Oscar, Toby and Oliver and Mrs Hobbs attended the Salters Institute of Chemistry competition held at Lincoln University. Pupils from six other schools also attended.

After some welcome refreshments, we made our way to the labs in the University that were built only recently - in around 2014. We were introduced to Dr Lear the Head Judge. Dr Lear told us that we would be judged on our cleanliness of working and how well we approached the challenge as a team, as well as who got the answers right of

course. Our first activity was the 'Salters' Challenge'; we had to solve a murder mystery by using chromatography, identifying powders and undertaking acid/alkali testing. Even trickier was that the first part of this challenge was to decode the actual challenge details that were written in chemical symbols: thankfully we were given the key to which symbol corresponded to which letter of the alphabet, else that task might have taken us all day!



Following lunch, our afternoon activity was the 'University Challenge'; this consisted of (in 35 minutes) making as many colours as possible from a range of solid salts and water. It was harder than you would think, as multiple combinations made the same colour. The final part of the day was the Prizegiving where all, but one, school received a prize. The Carre's team won the 'University Challenge' and came fourth in the 'Salters' Challenge' (I really think this was a good result as I learnt from Mrs Hobbs on the way that Carre's hadn't won any of the challenges in a long time). All in all, we all agreed that it was a very fun day and it was an eye-opening experience to see the range and amount of scientific equipment at the University.

Under-13 Lincolnshire Basketball Team

On Sunday 22 April, the Lincolnshire Under-13 basketball team travelled to Northamptonshire to compete in the East Midlands regional tournament. The team was comprised of:

The nature of the tournament is such that all teams play one another across the day, enabling the East Midlands coaches to select the provisional East Midlands team to represent the region in July. Lincolnshire's first game saw the team compete against Northamptonshire and, in truth; there wasn't a huge difference between the two teams. Lincolnshire's downfall was that they failed to convert their uncontested lay-ups, which led to a turnover and led to the points differential flattering the opposition. Feeling slightly deflated the Lincolnshire team then played tournament favourites Leicestershire. Lincolnshire kept the game to a tight margin for much of the first quarter but were again hindered by their inability to convert their baskets. Leicestershire, by contrast, seemed to score on every offense and fully deserved their 35 point victory.

Despite losing their first two games, the team were in high spirits as they prepared to play Derbyshire. There was a feeling that the players felt more relaxed and were starting to settle into the tournament, whereas there was a sense of apprehension at the start as many of the Lincolnshire players do not play outside of school and were competing against players who play 2-3 times per week for their clubs. The game started well; with Lincolnshire taking an 8-4 lead inside the first quarter. The two teams competed side-by-side throughout the duration of the game, with Lincolnshire aided by an outstanding performance by Archie who had 10 points and was 5-for-5 from the field. With 45 seconds remaining, Lincolnshire was down by 3 points and were putting enormous pressure on the Derbyshire defence. With 5 seconds remaining, quick ball movement led to the ball finding William at the arc with a 3 point attempt to tie the game. The ball hit the front of the ring, then the backboard before finding the grateful hands of the Derbyshire forward.

Carre's Gymnasts Take Bronze at National Championships

On Sunday 6 May four Carre's Grammar School students travelled to Fenton Manor, Stoke-on-Trent to compete in the British Schools Floor and Vault Gymnastic Championships. Having progressed their way through the County and East Midland rounds, they faced a new challenge which potentially would include the best teams from Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland as well as nine English regions.

The boys Dan (14) Tom (13) Max (13) and Will (12) were un-phased by the size of the complex and standard from the other teams and entered the arena brimming with confidence. They had been selected to perform on vault in the first rotation and Max got the team off to a flying start with two strong vaults, both with superb landings. The others followed suit, with all boys scoring well and very few points between them.

The second rotation brought them to the floor where they had to compete not only against talented gymnasts, but also the blaring music being piped out at incredible volume for the girls performing on the adjacent floor. This time Dan set the standard with a well-controlled, powerful routine which scored an impressive 14.003. As the rest of the team duly went through their sequences with few mistakes, the gymnasts seemed to be happy with their work and thought they'd done enough to find a place on the podium.

After much pomp and ceremony, which saw all two hundred gymnasts that had competed in the morning march back into the arena, the students were finally rewarded for their efforts by achieving third place and were presented with bronze medals accordingly. Well done boys!

A morning of goals, getting stuck in and girls football



Despite the cold and rainy conditions back in May, 18 girls enjoyed a morning of football hosted at Carre's Grammar School.

The girls, part of the Lincolnshire FA 'Wildcats' programme and Sleaford Town JFC, put their skills into practice playing a number of small sided games.

Wildcats - a nationwide programme - aims to provide girls aged from 5 to 11 with regular opportunities to play football and take part in fun, organised sessions. The local partnership with Sleaford Town JFC has allowed the girls to train on a weekly basis at Carre's.

Matthew Evans, PE and Sport Advisor at Carre's Grammar School, said: "It's a great opportunity for girls in the local area to get involved in football. We've only been running the programme for a short while and week upon week we are seeing more and more girls getting involved."

The growth of female football at grass root level is largely linked to the success of female teams within the professional game, most notably the success of the England Women's team. Mr Evans added: "National and professional success is fantastic for us because not only are the girls provided with role models to aspire to, but from a financial side of things, we receive greater funding, meaning we can make it more accessible to people, hosting events such as this one."


