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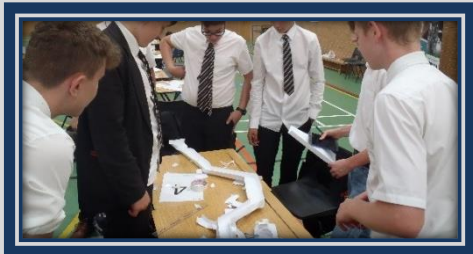

Careers and Higher Education

On 7 October we welcomed the University of Leeds Outreach Team to Carre's. We were joined for the day by Ella Allard who gave talks to all year groups.

Years 7 – 10 were given insightful knowledge about the benefits of Higher Education, why this should be considered in future career planning as well as what 'University Life' can be like.



Year 11s had an afternoon session discovering how Sixth Form choices, which are on the horizon, can have a direct impact on university as well as course choices. Students were introduced to a website which allows them to explore courses and helps them link to which university provides such.

Year 12 finished the afternoon with a talk on 'making the most of Year 12'. They were encouraged to consider volunteering, part time jobs and developing life skills to have a broad bank of activities to draw upon when making applications. The afternoon was very much about how to 'stand out from the crowd'. The students were quite surprised at how competitive some courses are and how oversubscribed they can be.



Mrs Hickmore, Director of RCT Sixth Form, organised a mini **Oxbridge Conference** on Wednesday 16 October. Oxbridge representatives gave a presentation to Year 12 students who are considering Oxford or Cambridge applications next year.

We also had reps visiting to carry out Oxbridge interview workshops for current Year 13 students who have applied this year to Oxford or Cambridge.

Students from SJSF, The King's School and Priory Ruskin Academy attended the workshop and interviews.

A SJSF careers event with exhibitors from universities, industry, gap year providers and local employers took place on **30 October** at St George's Academy.

Sixth Form



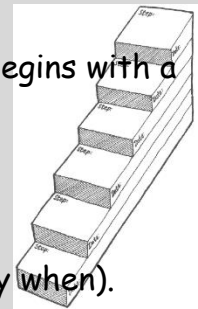
Attendance

Students are expected to **maintain attendance of 90%** throughout their time in the Sixth Form. There is a strong link between attendance and academic achievement. A student with 80% attendance during their time in the Sixth Form misses over 2 terms worth of lessons. Being 5 minutes late each day equates to 3 whole days lost per year, while 30 minutes late each day equates to 19 days lost. You can imagine the impact this has on academic performance.

Thought for the week

The higher you progress up the school, the more likely it is that you're going to get pieces of work that require more than one sitting to complete. This means that you will be unlikely to sit down and finish the whole activity or project in one go. Sooner or later you're going to get a piece of homework or coursework that you know is going to take a few hours to complete. At first this can be quite daunting.

There's an old Chinese proverb that says 'A journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step'. Chunking will help you take that first step.



Step 1 - make a list of the tasks you need to do.

Step 2 - set yourself some milestones (what you need to have done and by when).

Step 3 - decide on the order of activities, and pin this up somewhere clear and prominent.

During the morning session, students from each of the different schools worked together to research, plan and present a campaign to improve the local area considering important issues such as housing, the environment, anti-social behaviour and sports and leisure facilities. With local Councillors and staff from NKDC on hand to guide and support the students, we were introduced to a range of activities and provided with an invaluable insight into some of the important tasks undertaken by the Local Council.

In the afternoon a voting booth was set up in the hall and students learnt about the importance of registering to vote for elections and how votes are verified and counted. Students were then able to vote for the Candidate representing each of the different teams.

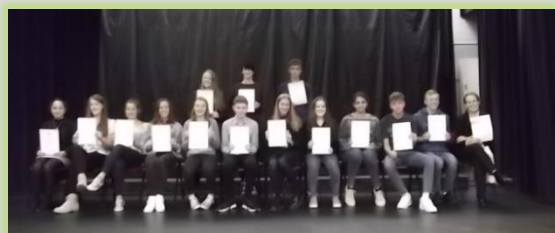

A Gift to Carre's - No One is Too Small to Make a Difference

You can read the inspirational speeches of Greta Thunberg thanks to an author, a bookseller, a publishing giant and over 650 crowdfunding champions.

The Swedish teenage climate change activist Greta Thunberg's campaigning has gained international recognition and numerous honours and awards. She is a fellow of the prestigious Royal Scottish Geographical Society, named as one of the 100 most influential people of 2019 by Time magazine and has been nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize. In September 2019, she addressed the UN Climate Action Summit in New York. A collection of some of her earlier speeches, called 'No One Is Too Small to Make A Difference' has been published by Penguin.

During the summer holidays British author Melissa Harrison witnessed a young child buying a copy of Greta's book which prompted her to send an order via social media to a bookseller. It was her intention to buy a few copies for her local school and within minutes several of her social media followers offered to do the same. In a matter of hours, a crowd funder campaign had been launched to raise £3,000; enough to fund 10 copies of the book to go to each of 100 schools. The target was soon surpassed, and publishers Penguin promised to match-fund the first £10,000 raised.

Mrs Livsey, Teacher of Cookery and IT, nominated Carre's to receive 10 copies and these are now available for anyone to borrow from the Learning Resource Centre.

Thank you, Melissa, Big Green Bookshop, Penguin and all the generous fundraisers.

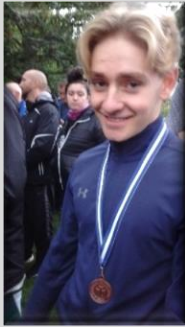

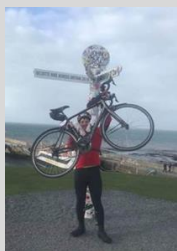

Basketball England Volunteer Awards

On Saturday 7 September, Basketball England held their annual Conference Awards Dinner at the University of Manchester to celebrate the success of the sport at all levels over the past 12 months. The conference included presentation of the Basketball England Volunteer Awards, to "recognise the selfless dedication and efforts of volunteers across the Basketball Community". A total of 14 awards were available within each region, covering all aspects of volunteering within the sport of basketball. Regional winners were selected for each award, with three being shortlisted to receive the national award.



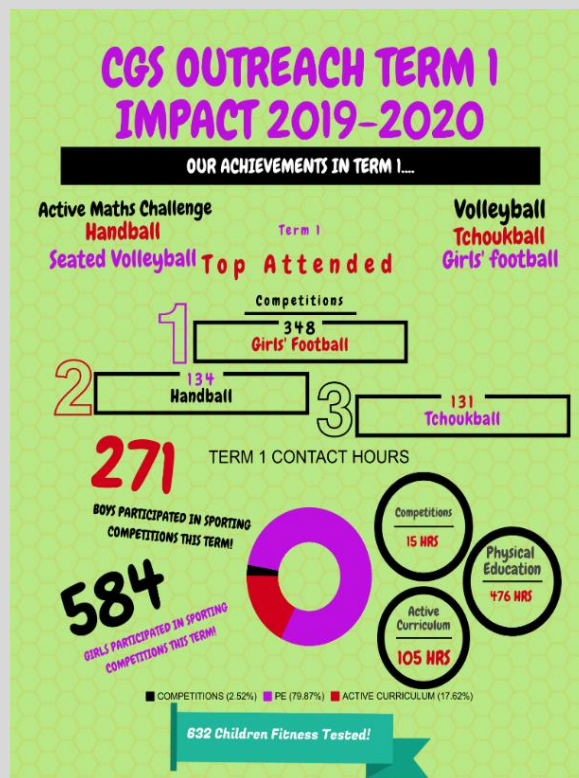
In August, Basketball England published the regional winners for the East Midlands with Carre's Grammar School PE teacher, Russell Smith, winning the category of Teacher of the Year for the second successive year. Others nominated were Siobhan Prior who was part of Team England's silver medal winning team at the 2018 Commonwealth Games. Siobhan has helped with the junior teams at Nottingham Academy, who Carre's played in the under-12 Jr. NBA this year. Basketball England's nomination was as a result of Russell acting as a basketball ambassador within Carre's Grammar School and Lincolnshire. He organises all schools basketball in the county, is Head Coach of the under-13 Lincolnshire team, is an LBBA committee member and has set up a Level 2 referees' course, among many other duties over the past 12 months.

The nominees for the national Teacher of the Year award were Ali Arber, Daniel Hildreth and Russell Smith, who was shortlisted for the second consecutive year. Russell was runner-up in the same category in 2018. On this occasion, however, Russell went one better than the previous year to receive the award of Basketball England's national award of Teacher of the Year.



This nomination is deserved recognition for the hard work that has gone into developing basketball at Carre's Grammar School and efforts to encourage more young people to play the sport competitively.

DON'T BE FOOLED



Dear Parent or Guardian,

We need your help to warn young people about the dangers and consequences of becoming a money mule.

What is a money mule?

A money mule is someone who transfers stolen money through their own bank account on behalf of someone else and is paid for doing so.

Criminals need money mules to launder the profits of their crimes.

Young people are increasingly being targeted to become money mules. They are approached online or in person, including through social media, at school, college or sports clubs. Sometimes people they know persuade them to take part, often because they are also acting as money mules.

Mules will usually be unaware of where the money comes from – commonly fraud and scams – and that it can go on to fund crimes such as drug dealing and people trafficking.

Being a money mule is illegal.

When someone is caught, their bank account will be closed, and they will have problems getting student loans, mobile phone contracts and credit in the future. They could even face arrest for money laundering which carries a maximum sentence of 14 years in prison.

What to look out for

Tell-tale signs that someone might be involved could be them suddenly having extra cash, buying expensive new clothes or top-of-the-range mobile phones and gadgets with very little explanation as to how they got the money. They may also become more secretive, withdrawn or appear stressed.

Vandalism and Litter

There have been a number of incidents of vandalism in the male toilets including taps being wrenched from their sockets and the sinks loosened, causing flooding to the toilets. This is unnecessary and gratuitous vandalism and causes the toilets to be closed until they can be fixed, often resulting in considerable repair costs to the school.



There are numerous rubbish bins around site, yet every week our team of student duty litter pickers spend time at break and lunch picking up litter from around the site including; crisp, biscuit and chocolate wrappers, various plastic bottles, half eaten sandwiches and fruit etc.



During the summer break, the Site Team unblocked the sinks in the science labs and found: wooden tapers, rubber bungs, bits of metal and pens/pencils rammed down the plug holes.

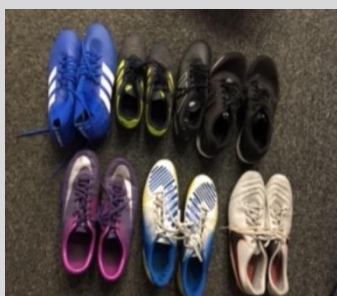
It is important that students respect the school site, equipment and toilet areas in order that everyone can benefit from the facilities.

Badge and Braid

Unfortunately, we no longer stock badge and braid that can be sewn onto school blazers. The price increase in these items and the requirement to order in bulk has meant that stocking these items is no longer viable.

School Trips

If you have registered an interest in an extra-curricular school trip and your son/daughter decides they no longer want to go, please can you inform the school so that you are not chased for money and the place can be offered to another student.



PE Kit and School Property

Please label all PE kit and school clothing/property. This enables us to return items to students.

These are just some of the football boots in lost property that are unnamed. If they are not claimed, they will put into the lost property amnesty at the end of term, along with PE tops, shorts, shirts, school trousers, water bottles, pencil cases, coats, ties and other items.

Mobile Phone Policy for Sixth Form

I would like to take this opportunity to clarify the use of mobile phones by Sixth Form students in school so that, if in the event of a mobile phone being confiscated for the day, parents and carers are clear as to the procedure and reasons for confiscation.

We believe that teachers and students have a right to teach and learn in a school environment which is free from interruption by mobile phones and other such devices. It is the school's responsibility to promote the safe and responsible use of mobile phones during the school day and consequently the mobile phone policy was adopted and includes the SJSF policy for Sixth Form students.

It is recognised that Sixth Form students should have some privileges regarding the use of mobile phones in school; however, it is also essential that they model the responsible use of such devices to their younger peers. The following represents the behaviour expected of Sixth Form students:

- Students should not walk around the school site using phones between lessons and at break and lunch in view of the younger students.
- Year 12 and Year 13 students can only use mobile phones at break/lunch in their own Sixth Form areas – the conservatory and/or upstairs Sixth Form workroom; therefore, not in classrooms, around the outside of school, in reception etc.
- Sixth Form students should not use their mobile phones in the LRC at any time as this is an area also used by Key Stage 3 and Key Stage 4 students.
- Sixth Form students should not use their mobile phones in study areas (conservatory, upstairs workroom) during lesson times unless given specific instruction/permission to do so by a member of staff. Mobile phones which have a calculator, music or camera facility may only be used in class or the workrooms during lesson times following instruction or permission to do so from the teacher.

If a Sixth Form student is found to be in breach of the school mobile phone policy their phone will be held with Mrs Body, the Executive Headteacher's PA, in her office. The student can collect their phone at the end of the school day at 3.40pm. This applies to Year 12 and Year 13 students on every day of the week, including Wednesday for Year 13 students, who currently have the privilege of Wednesday afternoon home study. Some students have tried to collect their phones at lunch or break in order to pay for food etc. Students should ensure they have sufficient money to make purchases without their phone because the phone will not be returned until the end of the school day.

Emergency School Closure

As we are approaching the winter season we would to remind parents of the arrangements for emergency school closure.

As a matter of policy the school will make every effort to remain open. However, severe weather can sometimes lead to transport problems which make it impossible for the school to function normally. In the unlikely event that the school will be closed, a notice will be posted on the front page of our website at www.carres.uk by 7.30am. Information will also be posted on the Lincolnshire County Council website and the information will be broadcast on BBC Radio Lincs and Lincs FM.

The school has the facility to send text messages to inform parents of the school's closure. We will endeavour to notify all parents by text as soon as a decision has been made to close the school.

Catering Accounts

Does your son/daughter know their daily spend allowance in The Chill? Do they have enough money on their account? The daily spend default is £5 per day but this can be amended by contacting the school office. Students need to be aware of how much they are spending in The Chill and ensure they have enough money on their account.

Free School Meals

Lincolnshire County Council has a new process to apply for Free School Meals which went 'live' for parents to use on Tuesday 4 September via the following parent portal link:

LCC will process eligibility checks for Free School Meals.

Is my child eligible?

Your child may be eligible if you are in receipt of one or more of the following qualifying benefits:

- Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods)
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of state Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on - paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

Children who get paid these benefits directly, instead of through a parent or guardian, can also get free school meals.
