## Year 12 visit to the British Library – 19 January 2018

I am delighted to be able to offer Year 12 English Language students the opportunity to attend a lecture on Friday 19 January by the world-famous Linguistics Professor, David Crystal, on pronunciation and accent. In addition to the lecture, there will be a workshop run by an expert from the British Library on accent and dialect. Students will also be able to see an informative exhibition at the British Library about Sound. This is a free exhibition and students will also have free time to explore other exhibitions in the foyer and galleries. The whole day will be hugely beneficial especially helping the students in their preparation for Paper 1, Paper 2 and the non-examined assessment. The cost of the trip is £23 to cover the price of the train ticket and the cost of the lecture. Students will also need money for an evening meal and they may like to bring a packed lunch for the train. The dress code is smart casual.

The free exhibition is Sound. Students will the opportunity to explore the British Library sound archive. They will be able to look at the significance of sound since the phonograph was invented in 1877.

Sounds Familiar is the free workshop which is led by British Library research staff. Experts in English accents and dialects, this session introduces ways of analysing spoken English. Through this classroom-based talk, students will learn about language change, language variation, and regional vocabulary, pronunciation and grammar in the UK. Students will be introduced to Sounds Familiar, a site that captures and celebrates the diversity of spoken English in the second half of the 20th century, and *Voices of the UK*, a British Library research project that opens up the BBC Voices sound recordings to students and researchers.

David Crystal's lecture is tailored to meet the demands of the two main forces behind language: intelligibility and identity. Using his knowledge of phonetics, linguistics and physiology – as well as examples ranging from Eliza Doolittle to Winston Churchill – David Crystal explores the origins of national and international accents, how they are influenced by class and education, and how their peculiarities have changed over time.
